We Got A Grant! Now We Need Go-Getters!

One of the reasons SNAP came into being was to tackle the problem of the alarmingly large number of homeless animals that are being destroyed in Southwest Missouri. A shelter study conducted in 2000 revealed that the largest percentage of animals surrendered come from the lowest-income neighborhoods in Springfield. The Housing Authority of Springfield (HAS) allows residents to own cats and dogs if they are neutered by the age of six months, but when the average annual income of families is \$5,000, the cost of getting a pet fixed is prohibitive. Hence, many pets run loose, reproduce, and when caught, are turned into shelters where roughly half are euthanized.

Some families have been known to comply with the HAS rule by keeping their cat or dog until it reaches the 6-month age limit. When they can't afford to fix the pet, they turn it in and get another puppy or kitten in the free-to-good home ads. In such instances, pets become disposable, replaceable, and dispensable. These pet owners believe they have no other options, but SNAP's new Project Spay & Stay, funded by a grant, will help end this cycle by allowing HAS tenants to comply with the HAS spay/ neuter regulation.

SNAP believes that Project Spay & Stay will ...

- Demonstrate the program's effectiveness to other landlords so they might allow fixed pets in their housing
- Increase public awareness that fixing one's pet is the best overpopulation solution

- Market Reduce the number of unwanted animals
- I Lower the tax burden required to capture, house and euthanize homeless animals.

This grant will make a huge difference in the lives of HAS tenants and their pets. SNAP's Second Annual Ice Cream (You Scream) Chill-Out a Shrieking Success!!



Right now, one of SNAP's volunteers is attempting to tame three feral kittens captured when their shelter was inadvertently disturbed. If Will Feral, Laura Ingalls Wilder, and Feral Fawcett do not respond to human contact, they will be speutered and released back into a feral cat com-





munity. This is the preferred non-lethal control method for dealing with the millions of homeless wild cats in the U.S.: Trap-Neuter-Release (TNR).

Alley Cat Allies established National Feral Cat Day to enlighten animal welfare professionals about TNR, to offer a means of reducing the feral cat population without active extermination, and to educate communities about the fact that TNR works! It is, in fact, the most effective, lowest cost method of reducing feral cat communities.

To promote a growing awareness of feral cat colonies, veterinarians around the country are volunteering to speuter wild felines at no or minimal cost on National Feral Cat Day. You, too, can make a difference by educating yourself and others about TNR and by advocating TNR-friendly policies and services in the Ozarks. For more information, log onto www.alleycat.org.
